Other 2004 activities: In addition to programs and field trips, PRAS also took the following "political" actions: 1. Urged Friendship Township & Emmet County to "use due diligence" regarding a proposed development north of Harbor Springs, noting concerns about the Red-shouldered Hawk (a threatened species in Michigan).

- 2. Endorsed a Citizens Against Toxins initiative urging the City of Petoskey to minimize its use of pesticides.
- 3. Adopted new by-laws, which took effect on January 1, 2005.
